The meeting was called to order by President Jan Palmer. Jim Green gave our invocation. The speaker, Jackie Faber, was introduced, followed by breakfast being served by Brenda Austin, Bruce Glascock and Bonita Lenger. Because I was out of town, Leigh Kottwitz took notes.

Rich introduced Jackie Faber with Columbia Foot Care. She is an RN and has been a nurse for over twenty-seven years. She started doing foot care five years ago and added this to her internal care clinics. She took over a business at the senior center eight months ago with two other nurses. Her main office is at the Columbia Senior Center, but she also goes to Boonville and to some nursing homes. Visits normally take about 30 minutes.

Jackie also does home visits, but appointments at the Senior Center are recommended.

Feet are the foundation of your mobility, but are often overlooked since many people cannot bend over to get to their feet or safely manipulate the clippers. Some people have poor sensation in their feet or fragile skin. Tools that Jackie uses are either single use or properly cleaned after each patient. Foot care nurses are not common, in fact there are only a few in Columbia. There is a doctor in the state of Washington who has helped train nurses for foot care.

Jackie can also work on ingrown toenails or refer patients to a podiatrist. She can recommend ways to manage foot issues and provide client education. She has dealt with difficult nails due to fungus and can work on calluses and corns as well, She does not polish nails or soak feet since she knows of no medical benefit to soaking. If you are soaking your feet, the basin needs to be washed after each time you use it. Vinegar or Listerine in the water helps with fungus. Clorox should be used highly diluted in a foot soak. Hydrogen peroxide is a very harsh substance and will damage healthy skin. MB27 is an old athlete's foot treatment that has been used by some people since athlete's foot is very common, but she recommends an over-the-counter product she purchases online. If your feet are damp, she recommends a powder or spray. Make sure you dry your feet and moisturize them well.

For podiatrists, she recommends Dr. Blanchard at Boone Hospital; nurse practitioner Parvin Behrouzi-Jareh with University of Missouri Hospital or Dr. Foster, who works independently. Most podiatrists are not trimming toenails because insurance is not covering that service. Footwear is important. When your feet hurt, you hurt all over and your mobility is affected.
